Yet, by and large, we are terrible at it. The reason, says longtime mediator Chad Ford, is fear. When conflict comes, our instincts are to run or fight. To transform conflict, Ford says we need to turn toward the people we are in conflict with, put down our physical and emotional weapons, and really love them with the kind of love that leads us to treat others as fellow human beings, not as objects in our way. We have to open ourselves up with no guarantee that anyone on the other side will do the same. While this can feel even more dangerous than conflict itself, it allows us to see the humanity of others so clearly that their needs and desires matter to us as

much as our own. Ford shows dangerous love in action through examples ranging from his work in the Middle East to a deeply moving story about reconciling with his father. He explains why we disconnect from people at the very time we need to be most connected and the predictable patterns of justification and escalation that ensue. Most importantly, he gives us a path to practice dangerous love in the conflicts that matter most to us.

Based on archival research, this study of Pancho Villa aims to separate myth from history. It looks at Villa's early life as an outlaw and his emergence as a national leader, and at the special considerations that transformed the state of Chihuahua into a leading centre of revolution.

And if I could bring that about today by giving up my life, I would do it gladly." - Pancho Villa "Pancho Villa," people whispered at the beginning of the 20th century, "can march 100 miles without stopping, live 100 days without food, go 100 nights without sleep, and kill 100 men without remorse." The legend of Francisco Villa is full of heroism, tragedy and romance. It is the story of a poor farmer boy who became a bandit out of necessity, after avenging an injustice on his family; a military genius who fled from an oppressive government to

lead the largest revolutionary army in his country's history, and defeated dictatorship to become Mexico's liberator, only to fall again in disgrace when his troops abandoned him or were massacred by the enemy. Pancho Villa and his cavalry, Mexicans point out with a certain amount of pride, invaded the United States, and although they came and tried to capture him, they never found him. This is, at least, the version that most of them know, but it's certainly not the same as in their textbooks. The story of Francisco Villa bypassed official censorship from generation to generation, like leaves sailing at full speed on the surface of a stream. But the historical reconstruction is full of nuances. Was he a freedom fighter, or a bandit? Was he a Mexican Robin Hood, or a thief and a murderer? Was he present when his troops invaded U.S. territory? Was the advance of his famous "Dorados" (the "golden ones," the name of his troops) the cause for joy, or terror among the people as they passed the countryside towards Mexico City? Pancho Villa's personality has been controversial since the very beginning of his career as a General of the revolutionary army. Many biographies have been written about him, the first of which dates back to only a few years after his death. Counting the number of books who take one of those two sides-butcher or freedom fighter-would be impossible, but they would probably form two piles of equal size. Through them, readers can learn divergent tales about one of the most widely known Mexicans, both in his country and abroad. For many Mexicans, he is a hero. In schools, teachers still speak cautiously about him to new generations of children, who are amazed by the tough guy with hat

and pistols. And the old, those who had heard about his exploits from their parents, declare that Villa himself will ride again through the mountains of Mexico, on the day when the poor can no longer stand and a new revolution explodes. As Octavio Paz eloquently put it, "The brutality and uncouthness of many of the revolutionary leaders has not prevented them from becoming popular myths. Villa still gallops through the north, in songs and ballads; Zapata dies at every popular fair. ... It is the Revolution, the magical word, the word that is going to change everything, that is going to bring us immense delight and a quick death." In Paco Roca's intensely intimate and international award-winning graphic novel, *The House*, three adult siblings return to their family's quaint vacation home a year after their father's death. They each bring their respective wives, husbands, and children there with the intention to clean up the residence and put it on the market, but as garbage is hauled off and dust is wiped away, decades-old resentments quickly fill the vacant home. Through flashbacks into each sibling's memories — the fig trees they

grew up climbing, the pergola they never got around to build, the final visits to the hospital — Roca gives us a glimpse into domestic moments of joy, guilt, and disappointment while asking what happens to brothers and sisters when the only person holding the family together is now gone. Much like the film *The Big Chill*, *The House* is both painful and touching, brilliantly rendered on panoramic pages by Roca, who is known for his empathetic books like the 2017 Eisner Award-nominated *Wrinkles*. At once deeply personal (dedicated to Roca's own deceased father) and entirely universal, *The House* details the struggle to overcome the past, but still hold onto the memories.

It is a well-constructed work, easily intelligible to a live audience, and yet within this careful structure there is a powerful depiction of primary emotions. The basic elements of war, rivalry, hatred and love, honour, shame and fear are all given their place in the drama, and these elements are then bound together in a dramatic plot that exploits them to the full. The political and the personal tensions are made to overlap in an easy, unforced way, and in spite of its lyrical title, Garcia Gutierrez never allows the lyrical elements to make us lose sight of the baser concerns of self-love and abuse of authority that are also present. Professor Trimble makes the point in his Introduction

that the work "invites the spectator/reader to fill in the blanks" left by the sketchy information about the background of the characters. This, it seems to me, is one of the great strengths of the play, its relentless focus on the conflict between love and duty that is at its centre ? The first duty of a translator is to be as faithful to the original text as possible, and Robert Trimble has given us a very faithful rendering in simple English prose of this romantic masterpiece. I have been struck on many occasions in my reading and re-reading of his translation by the detailed care and attention that have been paid to every word in the text. Nothing of any significance has been left out in the transfer from one language to the other. Inevitably on occasion I have compared a putative translation of my own with that of the present text, and in general I have been very impressed by just how close to the original Professor Trimble has managed to come, whereas I might have been tempted to "squeeze" the meaning, for example in some passages of poetry or song. Readers can be assured, therefore, that the copy of the play now in their hands is a true account of Garcia Gutierrez's *El trovador*. As the translator notes, he has preferred to use prose throughout, doubtless in the interest of achieving a maximum level of fidelity to the original text. Robert Trimble has performed a very valuable service to international culture by making this translation available to students of drama, of romanticism, and of literature in general.
